### ABOUT **DENMARK**

Denmark is a country in northern Europe made up of the Jutland Peninsula and more than 400 islands in the North Sea. Due to its geographic situation, Denmark has a relatively mild climate with no extremes of heat or cold. Being part of Scandinavia, Denmark enjoys the light summer months from June to August with an average daytime temperature of 18-20°C and winter months from December to February with an average temperature of 0°C. Here the true Danish spirit comes into play: while the summer months encourage sunbathing, swimming and picnics, the wintertime calls for hot chocolate and candle lights at indoor social gatherings. Danes often refer to this snug and convivial wintery feeling as 'hygge'. It's a very Danish way of making the best of the long winters.

The Danish monarchy is the oldest continuing monarchy in the world and can be traced back to the 8th century. Today, Denmark has a constitutional monarchy, which means that the monarch cannot independently perform political acts. The Danish monarchy is a popular institution in Denmark and the current monarch, Her Majesty Queen Margrethe II, highly loved by her people, can trace her lineage back to the first Viking kings of Denmark over 1000 years ago! Thanks to its long monarchy, Denmark is filled with a rich array of royal monuments, buildings and treasures spanning a thousand

years. From castles and fortresses, to royal art collections and the Crown Jewels, you can experience royal Denmark at many sites across the country.

Time and time again, international surveys celebrate Denmark as the country in the world with the 'happiest' population. Of course, this does not mean that Danes are happily cheering in the streets. It shows that the Danes enjoy a very high level of satisfaction with life. They enjoy a balanced work life with a sense of financial security, freedom for individual, safety, strong respect, tolerance and trust for the community, and the opportunity to pursue and fulfil personal goals in life.

A clean environment is important to the Danes. Denmark is a frontrunner when it comes to green transition and was the first country in the world to establish a Ministry of Environment back in 1971. Half a century of focused energy policy has made Denmark a world leader in renewable energy technology, including wind turbines and energy efficient waste management. 44% of the energy is from wind power and 30% of all energy consumption in Denmark comes from renewable sources. Similarly, Denmark has many ongoing scientific projects to improve society towards a more sustainable daily life. Copenhagen is one of the most bicycle-friendly cities in the world, with priority

bicycle green waves and bicyclefriendly traffic regulation.

Reflecting its landscape, the Danish aesthetic is characterised by simplicity, minimalism and functionality. This philosophy is the core value of Danish design in fashion, food, architecture, furniture and art. You will find moments of quintessential Danish charm on a long sandy beach, admiring a Renaissance castle, on the bike lanes in the city, next to the smoking house in Bornholm or in a candlelit cafe that has perfected the art of 'hygge'.

The Danish cuisine is another reason many food enthusiasts travel to Denmark. Over the past 30 years, Danish food culture has rediscovered its roots and re-invented old recipes for contemporary diners. It emphasizes the use of local and seasonal ingredients and is a hit with both local and international foodies. Restaurant Noma, established in 2003, has been a showcase for New Nordic cuisine. Noma gained international attention when it won the title of the best restaurant in the world four times. Fine Danish restaurants hold a total of 35 Michelin stars in 2019, more than any other Nordic country.

In short — when you arrive in Denmark you will probably notice the relaxed atmosphere, a lot of people on bikes, and that things generally run smoothly. A blend of stately old buildings and modern sustainable architecture speaks of cities that treasure the old but love experimenting with the new. Chart-topping in green energy and quality of life, stunning dining and design, and a cheerful emphasis on 'hygge' — yes, you are at the right place. Welcome to Denmark!

## ABOUT COPENHAGEN

Sharing the prestige with Denmark of having the happiest people in the world, its capital, Copenhagen, has often been ranked as one of the world's most liveable cities. Every bit of Copenhagen is designed for its people and for living life. From the buildings and architecture, the green and the sea, the many bikes and the sophisticated infrastructure, to the development of new districts and city culture and public events, Copenhagen is firmly focused on providing a good ground for people's life balance between work and play and extended quality of life.

Copenhagen is a pocket-sized fairy tale and at the same time, a buzzing and innovative hub of ideas. It is a city large enough for every kind of life philosophy, but small enough to bike from one end to the other fast and safely. Through the kaleidoscope of Copenhagen, you see the urban pulse in the cobbled streets, the castles and churches, the artists, beer brewers, the gourmet restaurants and street food stalls, the parents with babies in their strollers, the hipsters and the uniformed, the Crown Prince and the Queen.

There are 0.8 million residents in Copenhagen with ten official administrative districts. Central Copenhagen can be split into 6 areas: Copenhagen city centre, Frederiksberg, Christianshavn & Holm, Vesterbro, Nørrebro, and Østerbro. You can easily bike from one grea to the other within

20 minutes or take public transportation, including the recently opened City Ring metro line.

### **Copenhagen Airport:**

Copenhagen Kastrup Airport (CPH) is the main international airport serving the city of Copenhagen as well as the whole region including Øresund. It is the largest airport in Scandinavia and the Nordic countries and one of the oldest in Europe. Located just 8 kilometres south of Copenhagen city centre, it can be reached by train (13 minutes from Copenhagen Central Station) or metro (M2 line 15 minutes from Nørreport).

The Danish Cuisine: 'Seasonal'. 'organic', 'innovative' are 3 key words for the latest campaign of new Danish kitchen. The restaurant scene in Copenhagen is an attraction in itself, from reasonably priced bistros to Michelin-starred places. Copenhagen has in total 15 Michelin stars and 10 Bib Gourmand restaurants. But when talking about everyday life, the Danes enjoy their hot dog (bread with sausage, ketchup and mustard) as well as smørrebrød (open faced sandwiches). You will find hot dog stalls in all corners of Copenhagen and smørrebrød in most Danes' lunch boxes.



Design & Architecture: Danish design, be it furniture or clothing, is known all over the world for its clean, simple lines, great materials and classic creations that never go out of style. Designing everyday products is a visible and strong part of Danish culture. On a larger scale, the recent architectural boom in Copenhagen is inspired by light, water, open spaces and sustainability and displays a strong tradition represented over time by names such as Jörn Utzon and Bjarke Ingels.

### Sustainable City to Bike

& Swim: Copenhagen was European Green Capital 2014 and aims to become the world's first carbon-neutral capital by 2025. In Copenhagen, you can swim in the clean waters of the city's harbour baths, stay in a sustainable hotel, eat organic, and ride the electric city bikes around the old maritime city. Life in Copenhagen is almost lived in the saddle of the beloved bicycles. In Copenhagen, people bike whether there is sun, rain or snow. The well designed bike lanes all around the city invite people to bike to work, to school, to take the kids to kindergarten, to shop for groceries and to go to social gatherings.

Top Attractions: Most of Copenhagen's popular attractions and sights are within walking distance. With a history that dates back to 1043, the city is full of historic landmarks, significant buildings and interesting sights and museums. Some of the most esteemed attractions include Tivoli Gardens (Vesterbro), the Little Mermaid (Østerbro), Strøget (city centre), Amalienborg Palace (city centre), the Round Tower (city centre), Christiansborg and Rosenborg Castle (city centre).

Built in 1956 by architect couple Eva and Niels Koppel, two of the most prominent post-war Danish architects, the current house is packed with furniture and decorations from the golden age of Danish design. Some of Denmark's most talented architects and designers such as Poul Henningsen, Børge Mogensen and Verner Panton have worked with the building down to the smallest detail of interior decorating.

The iconic Langelinie Pavillonen stands in the middle of central Copenhagen's backyard, next to the Citadel (military barracks since 1626), overlooking the sea, and just some steps away from Denmark's darling, the Little Mermaid. The initial Langelinie Pavillonen was started in 1884 for the Danish Organisation for Recreational Boating.

One of the most iconic lamps of Danish design saw the light of day in 1958 when Poul Henningsen (1894-1967) was given the task of designing a chandelier for the building. With the requirement that the lamp must not blind and by way of geometry and mathematical formula in mind, Poul Henningsen designed the PH Koglen (the Cone) for Langelinie Pavillonen. With the greatest respect for the architecture and history of the house, Langelinie Pavillonen has in recent years undergone a number of renovations and improvements in the desire to lift Langelinie Pavillonen into a more modern age focusing on quality in food, design, technology, logistics and people. In this reception, you are invited to dine and mingle with your colleagues in the room with a 270 degree view of Copenhagen that houses Arne Jacobsen's chairs and the PH Lamp.

The venue is within walking distance, no bus transfer will be provided. Meeting point is at Scandic Copenhagen, exact schedule will be provided in the Final Programme.

Øksnehallen is a former market hall, part of the Brown Meat Market started in 1879. The Ox hall was designed by Ludvig Fenger and was completed in 1901. It housed dealers' offices and had a capacity for 1600 head of cattle. The market hall remained in use until the White Meat Market was inaugurated in the 1950s.

In 1984 the Øksnehallen and the side stables were preserved, but it was not until 1993, in connection with the urban renewal at Vesterbro, that it was decided to develop Øksnehallen into the cultural and exhibition hall it appears as today.

Øksnehallen was an old cattle ranch, not a slaughterhouse. Since the beginning of the renovation, an aim was to keep the place original, and to make the renovation as environmentally friendly as possible. Among other things, all the stones in the floor are moulded from the old, scrapped floor material and all rainwater that falls on the building's 8000 m² roof is collected and used. The hall is leased by City of Copenhagen to a private company but with the condition that at least 43% of the events held must be cultural event and the remaining 57% can be business-oriented.

Among the events held annually in Øksnehallen are Copenhagen Comics and Historical Days.

### 19.15-03.00 Gala Dinner and Show at Wallmans Circus Building

The Circus Building on Axeltorv in the heart of Copenhagen is the oldest of its kind in Europe. This magnificent building was inaugurated with an enormous public celebration in 1886. Throughout its history a multitude of Danish and international circus troupes have played there.

In 1982 the City of Copenhagen began a comprehensive renovation with the objective of restoring the Circus Building to its original appearance. That led to highlighting its distinctive architecture with its enormous dome, arched corridors, festive lobby, coloured seating and the special circus atmosphere. After the restoration both the Circus Building itself and Verner Panton's colour scheme specially designed for the building were listed.

After the renovation and since 2003, Wallmans have occupied this Copenhagen cultural icon. Today this well-known, popular dinner party is the Circus Building's resident production and has entertained more than 800,000 quests.

The cast of the show comprises creative and professional dancers, singers and circus stars from many different corners of the world. Wallmans represents a whole show reel of performances that every guest, regardless of nationality and language, can be bowled over, entertained and thrilled.

If you want to discover the lovely city of Copenhagen, this is a perfect opportunity. In this 5-hour bus tour, the city authorised guide will not only give you a briefing of the history and background of Denmark, show you all the must-sees, but also the authentic stories about Danes and the daily life of Copenhagen.

Parliament and the National Museum. The famous Ny Carlsberg Glyptotek, Rosenborg Castle and Tivoli Gardens are of course also included in our itinerary.

Participants will have lunch in one of the city centre restaurants that serves traditional Danish cuisine. Our guide will give you an introduction to Danish culinary art who will explain how Danish cuisine has transformed from simple liver pâté to the star winning art on the international stage.

### FULL DAY PROGRAMME

### LOUISIANA MUSEUM AND KAREN BLIXEN MUSEUM

7 hours

In this tour we will take you away from the city and explore the beautiful north part of the Sealand Island. The tour will first bring us up to the north, passing the Danish Riviera, offering a beautiful view of the Øresund Strait with the Swedish coast beyond.

Our first stop is an inside visit to Louisiana Museum which is a leading international museum of modern art. Located on the coast, it strikes the rarest of balances between landscape, architecture, and art in a unique interaction. The museum has gained a reputation as a museum in touch with the zeitgeist of the contemporary art world and is included in the Patricia Schultz book 1,000 Places to See Before You Die and ranks 85th on a list of the most visited art museums in the world.

The tour continues to Karen Blixen's private home. Karen Blixen was a Danish poet, author and storyteller, who also wrote under the pseudonyms Isak Dinesen, Osceola and Pierre Andrezel. Karen Blixen considered herself a storyteller, and is compared with Scheherazade, in A Thousand and One Nights fairy tale telling the Caliph Shahryar adventure. Everything you will see in the room is exactly as how Karen Blixen decorated it, giving a vivid impression of the writer's day-to-day surroundings. Some of the furniture came from the farm in Africa, including Denys Finch Hatton's favourite chair and the chest that Karen Blixen's steward, Farah, gave her. After the visit at Karen Blixen Museum, the tour will continue back to Copenhagen and the hotel.

### ROSKILDE AND VIKING SHIP MUSEUM INCLUDING SAILING AND LUNCH ON M/S SAGAFJORD

### 7 hours

The history of the Scandinavian countries, particularly during the millennium from 300 A.D. until 1300 A.D., is very much a tale of Viking society, Viking campaigns of colonisation and sagas of heroism. In this tour we would like to give you a taste of the Viking story and one of the cities in Denmark established in the Viking age, Roskilde.

This tour will take you westward from Copenhagen, through farming countryside and small villages, some of which were founded by Vikings more than a thousand years ago. Along the way, you will see a number of Viking burial mounds and dolmens. Upon arrival in Roskilde – which was the capital of Denmark until 1417 – we will pay a visit to the twin spired Roskilde Cathedral. Construction of the Cathedral was commenced during the 12th century and additions have been made through the ages, in differing architectural styles. The Cathedral is the traditional burial place of Danish monarchs and contains 39 royal graves. This Gothic Cathedral is UNESCO listed.

We will continue to the Viking Ship Museum, which contains the remains of 5 Viking vessels which have been salvaged from the bed of Roskilde Fjord, where they were sunk more than a thousand years ago to prevent aggressive intruders gaining access to the town from the sea. After the visits, we will have a 2.5-hour sailing trip onboard of Sagafjord with a fantastic view over Roskildefjord. Lunch will be served onboard. After the sailing trip, we will return back to the hotel.







The average temperature during the daytime in June is about 20°C and 15°C in the evening.

### **ELECTRICITY**

Denmark uses the two-pin continental plug like most other European countries - it has two round pins and operates on 230V (volts) and 50Hz (cycles) AC.

### **OPENING HOURS IN SHOPS**

Common opening hours in stores are 10.00-18.00 on weekdays and 10.00-16.00 on the weekends. Many shops are not open on Sundays therefore you should always check the opening hours for the specific stores you're planning to visit.

### NIGHTLIFE

Copenhagen has a relaxed and lively nightlife. Whether you want to dance till the sun comes up or just have a beer or a cocktail with your friends, Copenhagen has something to offer for everyone. Beer dispensers and wine servings are available in almost all cafés and bars. Near the conference venue, you can party out in the Meatpacking District or hang out in one of Vesterbro district's coveted bars and cafés.



### **MUSEUMS**

Behind the cobblestoned streets and boutiques of Nordic design, Copenhagen also has world class museums that will show you Danish culture, society and let you learn more about its past. Some of the highlights waiting for you to discover in Copenhagen are: The National Gallery of Denmark, Ny Carlsberg Glyptoteket, National Museum, Thorvaldsens Museum, Design Museum, and many more. Within a short train ride from the city, you will find Louisiana Museum, Arken and the Viking Ship Museum.

### CREDIT CARD

The most common payment method is credit card payments. All major international credit cards are well accepted in shops, restaurants and hotels. Euro cash is accepted only in some stores therefore it is a good idea to ask beforehand if you wish to pay in cash in Euro.

### **BANKS**

Banks are open Mon-Fri from 10.00 to 16.00.

### **PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION**

In Copenhagen the trains, metro and buses (including waterbuses) can be accessed with the same ticket. All you need to know is how many zones you will pass on your journey. To plan your trip in Copenhagen, please visit www.journeyplanners.dk You can buy single ride tickets or City Pass at the ticket vending machine at all metro or train stations.

### SMOKING

Denmark has a smoking ban in all public indoor areas.

In Copenhagen, smoking is forbidden in public buildings and private businesses - including restaurants, shops, transport, entertainment venues, workplaces etc. There are some exceptions - you can still enjoy a cigarette in smaller pubs.

Some places have installed special smoking rooms but most refer smokers to the streets.



## TRAVEL TO COPENHAGEN

### **PASSPORT AND/OR VISA**

If you are an EU citizen, you will be required to have a passport or an ID card valid for the duration of your stay in order to enter Denmark for tourist visits of up to three months. Citizens of other countries must have a valid passport and some non-EU citizens are required to have a visa. Please contact your travel agent or the nearest Danish diplomatic post for information.

### **TRANSPORTATION**

It takes less than 15 minutes from Copenhagen Airport to the city centre by train or metro. Both metro and train run from Terminal 3. You will need to have a ticket for three zones, which costs DKK 38, or a City Pass. Vending machines for tickets are available at Terminal 3 or in metro stations.

### **TRAIN**

Take trains in the direction of any stops in Denmark (the opposite direction will be to Sweden). The closest train station to the conference venue is Copenhagen Central Station (13 minutes from the airport).

### **METRO**

Take the M2 line and stop at Kongens Nytorv and change to the M3 line to stop at Central Station (20 minutes from airport).

### **TAXI**

Taxis can pick up passengers outside Terminal 1 and 3 and will get you to downtown Copenhagen in about 20 minutes depending on traffic. It will cost approximately DKK 250-300. Credit cards are accepted by all taxis.

### TRAVEL BY CAR

Scandic Copenhagen Hotel has a parking garage (Q-Park) in the basement premises. Parking spaces cannot be reserved in advance. Hotel guests can pay directly at the machines or charge it to their room bills. 24-hours parking costs DKK210. Entrance of the garage can be found at Nyropsgade 42, DK-1602 Copenhagen.
